CCF Faculty Affiliate Study Suggests Children with Hearing Loss Experience More Bullying



[Dr. Andrea Warner-Czyz](#), CCF faculty affiliate, associate professor in the School of Behavioral and Brain Sciences, and researcher at the Callier Center for Communication Disorders recently published a study showing that youth with hearing loss experience higher rates of peer victimization than youth with typical hearing. The study, published in the journal *Exceptional Children*, showed that the kinds of bullying experienced by kids with hearing loss mimics patterns of bullying among kids with other special needs, but with higher rates of social exclusion.
