School Readiness Study Receives Additional Funding



Directed by CCF Director [Dr. Margaret Tresch Owen](#), the [Dallas Project on Education Pathways](#) has entered its third round of funding in determining how various factors combine to influence the development of school readiness and success of urban minorities. As one of the nation's first and longest longitudinal studies of childhood self-regulation development and its implications among African-American and Hispanic children, the study recently received a five-year competitive grant renewal of \$2.8 million from the National Institutes of Health in 2017 to study the students' transition into middle

school. [Dr. Margaret Caughey](#) of the University of Georgia co-leads the project, which has followed 407 low-income, African-American and Hispanic children since they were 2½ years old and examined the factors that contribute to disparities in their development of self-regulation skills, school readiness and trajectories of academic achievement in reading and math.
